past trauma and the challenges of being a single mom, she was introduced to cocaine as a way to cope with her significant demands. When her kids graduated high school, she moved out to the Downtown Eastside of Vancouver and starting using other substances. She then got diagnosed with HIV and lost her housing. She recalls a moment where she heard the banging of drums on East Hastings. She rushed over and found an Indigenous ceremony in progress. She began to weep, and from that moment, her life turned around. Now, she is a proud grandmother and health advocate for people who use drugs and those living with HIV. She works to support others as they navigate the health system and spearheads research projects to improve the care of people who use drugs. She strongly believes in the power of words and has worked to de-stigmatize and remove labels. When she visited the St. Paul's Hospital Emergency Department, she felt most respected when the staff "treated [her] as a human" and interactions were "reciprocal and respectful". Looking forward, Ms. N is excited to continue her international advocacy work and bring awareness to health challenges experienced by those living with HIV and people who use drugs.
